I would like to welcome everyone back for what I am sure will be a great school year. Summer affords us all the opportunity to spend time with family, rest, and recharge. But as July winds down and we reach early August, the excitement of a new school year is always welcome.

One event long in the making, and the source of much excitement is the opening of our new Early Childhood Center. We are very proud to offer this service to our youngest children and our community. A good educational foundation is critical for long-term success and we are thrilled to offer parents/guardians access to our highly rated preschool.

Another major event occurring during our first semester of school is the debut of Kentucky's new school accountability system. This new system is scheduled to go live at the end of September, and it will offer parents a new way to understand how their children's schools are performing. Commissioner Wayne Lewis described the new accountability system as, "Using school and student data from the 2018-2019 school year, the new system will provide an overall rating for each Kentucky public school ranging from 1 (the lowest) to 5 (the highest) stars. Schools' new star ratings, along with other important education data, will be available online.

As called for by the federal Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) and Senate Bill 1 of 2017, schools are held accountable for student assessment results in all core subjects (reading, mathematics, science, social studies and writing), improving the English language proficiency of English learners, student growth in reading and mathematics at elementary and middle school, and graduation and transition readiness at high school.

There are a few things in the 5-star accountability system all education stakeholders – from parents, to community members, to school administrators – need to understand.

First, the system is designed to focus attention on the need to close achievement gaps. The term "achievement gap" mean the difference in academic achievement between specific groups of students, such as economically disadvantaged students as compared to their wealthier peers and special education students as compared to students who do not use special education services. Closing such gaps is absolutely essential to Kentucky being able to better prepare each and every one of our students for success in postsecondary education and the workforce. A school or district that would have been a 5- or 4-star will be reduced by 1 star if it has significant achievement gaps. A school simply cannot be recognized as being one of the state's best if significant disparities between the performance of student groups remain.

Second, it is important everyone knows the hard work of districts and schools continues after they are notified of their ratings and performance in the accountability system. Accountability system results can be the beginning of meaningful conversations between schools and the families they serve. Once families can see where their school's strengths are and where there are opportunities for improvement, conversations can focus on how families can work together with their schools to improve opportunities for their children.

KDE has confidence that Kentucky's new 5-star rating and accountability system will help get more parents involved in their children's schools, help create a healthy dialogue about how to overcome challenges and gaps, and ultimately will help us ensure each and every child is equipped for a successful future."

I am confident our schools will receive ratings that are quite good and are indicative of the hard work of our students, parents, and staff. That being said, once we receive our results we will closely examine the available data and plan to make improvements in each school and in every subject area. Continuing the 'Tradition of Excellence' at Walton-Verona is our top priority and we are dedicated to meeting the needs of our students, parents, and community!

Being ready to learn is why students come to school, and as a principal, I want to make sure we deliver the great education our students deserve through great instruction that is standards-based, appropriately rigorous, research-based, engaging, and constantly assessed to help make well-informed instructional decisions. Our kids deserve nothing less. Our teachers are dedicated to these things, and I'm dedicated to providing them the support they need to accomplish it.

As stated earlier, I am so blessed and excited to be a part of this wonderful school. I have inherited a situation in which you can look back on the past fondly and with pride, appreciate and enjoy the present, and look forward to the future with eager anticipation – not all schools can boast of such things. I have the privilege of getting to work with awesome students every day who come from all sorts of backgrounds, and to the all the adults at home, I want to thank you for your support of our school, and for letting us hang out with your awesome kids.

Parent/Guardian Information

These are important reminders for parents/guardians:

- Student drop off before school and pick up after school are NOT permitted in the middle school lot. All morning drop offs and afternoon pickups must occur in the back lot behind the high school. Once your vehicle is between the two crosswalks then have your child exit your vehicle; please don't wait until you are at the 2nd crosswalk to unload as this slows down the traffic flow. Also, please do not drop off in the actual parking

- Please be aware of the new crosswalk installed on Alumni Dr. by the playground of the Early Learning Center. Students are to push the button on either side for the sign lights to start flashing before they attempt to cross.

School-wide PBIS

This school year we have implemented a Positive Behavior Interventions & Supports (PBIS) Program school-wide as a common language for our expectations of student behavior. This is a 2-3 year process and will be developed through the PBIS School Committee overseen by Mr. Morwessel. We have started by implementing our "Big 3" expectations which are "Be Respectful", "Be Responsible", and "Be Safe". All of our school rules, expectations, and procedures will tie back to one or more of the "Big 3." We have also already identified our attention signal which is the "Give Me 5" signal and our Voice Levels for all areas inside and outside of the building. We are excited to formalize this process in the middle school and will be working to teach the students through the PBIS Process.

Social-Emotional Learning Program

Another new program we are excited about in the middle school this year is our Social-Emotional Learning (SEL) program being implemented school-wide. Mrs. Gerrein is the lead on this program and has done a great deal of research on various research-based programs out there. After her research we have chosen the Second Step Program to implement the SEL for our students. The program occurs every Friday school-wide – for grades 5-7 it is completed during Bearcat Special time and for the 8th grade it is being completed in Mrs. Clancy's Communications Class. Feedback early on has been very positive and Mrs. Gerrein is to be commended for her work in organizing and preparing staff for this program. With the start of the school year, our school enrollment continues to grow. Our freshman class has 115 students; the sophomore class has 156 students; the junior class has 133 students and the senior class has 134 students. The sophomore class is the largest class our high school has ever seen, and I understand the eighth grade class has similar numbers. I guess more and more people are becoming aware of the excellent education our school system provides and continue to move in to our district!

In an effort to keep parents informed, information will be emailed to the email account we have on file in Infinite Campus. Parents will receive information via email that is relevant for the grade level of their child. As a high school staff, we are committed to giving the best education to all students who walk through our doors. We are committed to making our students transition ready by helping them with a smooth transition to college and career. Our students have multiple opportunities to reach the benchmarks on the ACT in order to avoid remedial classes at the college level, and also have many opportunities to earn career certification through the programs at our partnering technical schools or by successfully completing career pathways on our own campus. Career pathways offered at WVHS include Administrative Support, Agribusiness, Animal Science, Business Management, Culinary and Horticulture.

In addition to the multiple career pathways we offer at WVHS and with partnering technical schools, we also participate in dual credit course offerings with local universities. At the close of the 2018-19 school year, we had one-hundred and sixteen students enrolled in two-hundred and fifty-five dual credit course offerings. For the current school year we have one-hundred and twenty-nine students enrolled in three-hundred and sixty-two dual credit offerings. Our partnering dual credit institutions included Northern Kentucky University, Kentucky State University and Gateway Community and Technical College.

Public Notice

Asbestos Management Plan for Walton-Verona Schools

This notice is being issued to insure that you know that the Walton-Verona Board of Education is in compliance with both national and state regulations and laws that relate to building materials which contain asbestos that have been used in building construction in past years.

An inspection for building materials which contain asbestos has been completed for all buildings owned by Walton-Verona Board of Education. This inspection has been conducted by a certified inspector and the material samples were evaluated by an accredited laboratory. Building materials with as little asbestos as one percent (1%) have been identified and made part of a management plan for the school system.

A complete asbestos management plan for the school system is on file at the Walton-Verona Board of Education office. Also, a copy of the asbestos management plan for each individual school is on file in each building principal's office.

We will continue to notify you at least once each year on the status of the management plan. Should it be necessary, more frequent updates will be issued as a result of an additional inspection, normal surveillance practices, response actions, or remodel work which might disturb building material which contain asbestos. Every precaution will continue to be used to protect the well-being of students and employees of the Walton-Verona Schools.

Directory Information

From time-to-time school-related groups and organizations ask for the addresses of students or graduates. Attention Parents: Should your child need to be absent for 5 days or more due to illness, surgery, hospital stay, or certain extenuating circumstances, please contact the school where he/she attends. HOMEBOUND INSTRUCTION is available for students that have a qualifying ailment verified in advance by a doctor. Homebound Instruction allows your child to keep up with his/her school work and he/she is not counted absent while in this program.
