the importance of social-emotional learning, we are now focusing, more than ever before, not only on learning in the traditional sense, we are also focusing on the social-emotional health of our students. Welcome back to another school year! It is hard to believe we are already heading into September. With this "Principal's Pause" I thought I'd get our readers who are interested in elementary news caught up to speed.

First off, I'd like to welcome all of our new staff members to our school, our district and community. Some of the names, however, may sound familiar as they are Walton-Verona alumni or long-time community members. We've added several new teachers. Nataly Woodward came all the way up from Tennessee to teach 1st-grade. Hannah Burns is a recent NKU graduate who did her student teaching here last school year – she is our new 3<sup>rd</sup>grade teacher. And we have some new folks this year in our Special Education Department. Jesse Holten joins us from Erlanger-Elsmere and Ashley Miller, who helped us out last year as a long-term sub, is now on board permanently (she's a WV alum!). We also have two new para educators, Andrea Dennis and Patti Kennedy. We also have two new faces on our custodial staff, both WV grads - Colton Maines and Brandon Norris.

In new roles this year, Ruth Palmer has moved up to 3<sup>rd</sup>-grade from 1<sup>st</sup>-grade, Brittany Day moved to 2<sup>nd</sup>-grade from special education, Laura Robbins made the trip from Walton and the ECC to join us here where she will work with Kindergarten students with special education needs. And George Patti also made the trip from Walton over to the Verona Campus.

Our PTA is back in full swing this year. The PTA serves the school for the purpose of advancing the learning of our students and supporting the school as a whole. One of the most basic things you can do help continue this mission is by getting involved with the PTA. For \$5, you can register your family as PTA members. One of our biggest fundraisers of the year is our very popular Fall Festival, and after missing it last year because of the pandemic, it back on the calendar for Friday, September 24<sup>th</sup>. It

is a family friendly event full of teacher sponsored games, bounce houses, hayrides, food, silent auctions and much more. The PTA is also instrumental in many of the elementary school's other events such as AR Nights, Santa's Secret Shop and 4<sup>th</sup> Grade Survivor Day. The PTA also coordinates all of our volunteer efforts that go on at the school. Our school would not function at the high level it does, without their help.

MAP testing is coming up for all 2<sup>nd</sup> through 4<sup>th</sup> grade students through September. MAP (Measure of Academic Progress) is a computerized assessment of skills in reading and math that each child takes 3 times each year. The test is an "adaptive" one meaning the difficulty level of questions varies for each child depending on what the program picks up about your child based on previously answered questions. The RIT score is the number on a scale associated with the performance of each child. This score is shared with your child and is used to form short term goals for progress before the next series of MAP tests. The teachers are also able to use this information to form skill groups, diagnose trouble/weak areas and also possibly discover gifted students. Ask your child or his/her teacher about their MAP score.

We are on our way to a wonderful year, and we truly appreciate you trusting your children to us for their education!

2021-22 School Year Welcome back Bearcats!!!! Another school year has begun and I cannot express how happy I am to see our students, teachers, and staff back in the swing of things. We all hoped that we had put COVID behind us but unfortunately it is still here and quite possibly worse than before. I want to thank the students for wearing their masks while inside the school building; none of us like wearing them but it is the best line of defense to protect against the virus short of being vaccinated. Since over half of our students are not old enough for the vaccination then masks are our best option.

That being said, we will still be required to quarantine students who are exposed to people who test positive for the COVID virus. Please communicate with us here at the school if your child is exposed to someone with COVID in order to protect others from being infected. We are planning on providing synchronous instruction for those students who are required to quarantine due to exposure. We are awaiting delivery of some technology equipment in order to provide synchronous instruction and expect the resources to arrive within the next couple of weeks. Until then, all teachers are utilizing their Google Classrooms to keep all quarantined students up-to-date with what is going on in the classroom. Simply have your child log in to each of their Google Classrooms every day to see what work is posted and what is going on in each class daily. Once we have our synchronous instruction fully operational, we will be communicating that to all quarantined students.

My hope is to stay in person throughout the 2021-22 school year. We will make every effort to make this possible. We will need everyone's help with this, just like we did last school year. Continue to communicate exposures and infections to us promptly so we can follow protocols to keep our students and staff safe. Hopefully we can put the COVID Pandemic behind us once and for all in the very near future.
